

Investment Objective & Strategy

The **WealthStrat Moderate Prescient Fund of Funds** will aim to deliver a moderate long term total return. The manager shall have limited flexibility in terms of asset allocation and shall not be precluded from continually varying the underlying exposure to both local and offshore assets. The Fund will employ asset and limited geographical allocations to reflect changing economic and market conditions to maximise returns over the long term, the **WealthStrat Moderate Prescient Fund of Funds** will, apart from assets in liquid form, consist solely of participatory interest in Collective Investment Schemes which will invest in a diversified mix of assets, including but not limited to equities, property, preference shares, money market and fixed interest instruments. The equity allocation will be managed at a maximum effective exposure, including offshore equity, up to 60%. The underlying collective investment schemes are permitted to invest in listed and unlisted financial instruments in line with conditions as determined by legislation from time to time. The underlying portfolios will predominantly invest in South African markets but is however permitted to include investments in offshore jurisdictions subject to the investment conditions determined by legislation from time to time.

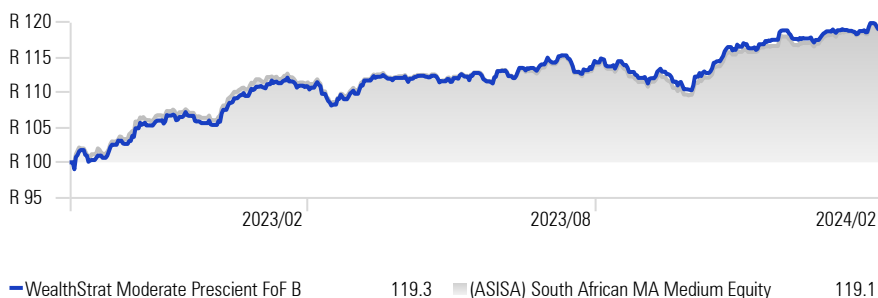

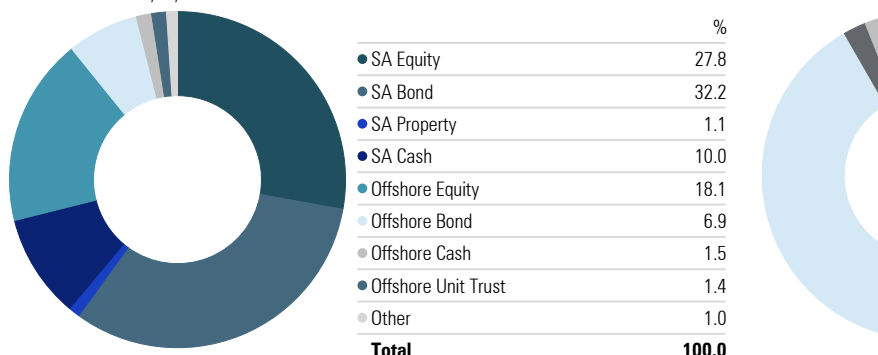

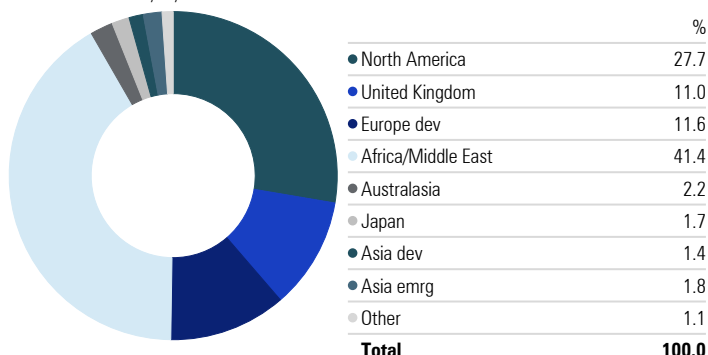

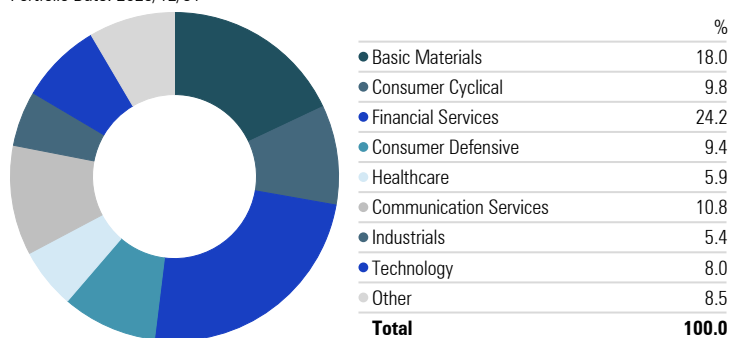
Equity Regional Exposure

Quarterly Fund Commentary

Moderate investors generated positive returns in the fourth quarter of 2023, as most risk assets recorded robust performance. Strong returns from global and local asset classes acted as a tailwind to the performance of the Portfolio over the quarter. However, the firmer rand acted as a headwind to the performance of global asset classes over the quarter.

The WealthStrat Moderate Prescient Fund of Funds returned +6.1% for the quarter and has generated a return of +12.9% over the past year.

The Portfolio remains diversified in terms of its exposure to various asset classes, and we remain confident in its ability to deliver inflation-beating returns over the long term, independent of the market environment.

Asset Allocation

Local bonds make up the bulk of the asset allocation within the Portfolio. This includes allocations to corporate, government and inflation-linked bonds. Short dated nominal bonds held up well over the quarter and produced a stable performance over the 2023 calendar year. Longer-dated instruments ended the quarter higher, as the yield curve shifted lower, with the longer dated part of the yield curve falling the most. The strength in the SA bond market was largely on the back of the risk on environment that led to an increased appetite for emerging market asset classes. All eyes will be on the upcoming budget speech scheduled for February, which will provide an update on the state of government finances. Local equities ended the quarter higher, and ended the year in positive territory, however, they lagged the broader emerging market complex. The strength in SA equities was largely driven by the Financials (+11.8%) sector, which ended the quarter posting double digit returns and is the best performing sector for the 2023 calendar year. Index heavyweights Capitec (+19.2%) and FirstRand (+18.8%) both ended in positive territory. Resources (+3.0%), while posting a positive quarter, lagged other sectors, as continued pressure on platinum and energy stocks dampened the return for the sector. Sasol (-29.0%), Impala Platinum Holdings Ltd (-7.7%) and Thungela (-11.4%) all recorded declines over the quarter. On the other hand, gold and iron ore exposed resource companies produced strong returns, as both metal prices moved higher over the quarter. Industrials (+5.9%) produced a positive return this quarter, however, the sector lagged the broader market. The positive return masked the volatile nature of the sector this quarter, on the back of movements in two of the larger listed industrial counters; Prosus and Naspers. Global equities had a robust quarter, with most equity markets ending in positive territory. Given the risk on environment, 10 of the 11 major sectors delivered positive returns for the quarter, with energy the only sector to record a negative number on the back of a falling oil price. Most global equity markets produced strong hard currency performance this quarter, with the rand providing a headwind to performance. Offshore bond and cash allocations contributed to performance, as global fixed income markets produced a strong performance in the final quarter of 2023, benefiting from the anticipated interest rate cuts by the US Federal Reserve. The firm rand, however, acted as a headwind to the performance of offshore allocations. A small allocation to local listed property contributed to performance this quarter, as the property sector produced a robust performance, as the risk on environment, coupled with strong performance from the larger listed players Growthpoint (+18.2%) and Redefine (+15.8%) led the sector higher. The fund's asset allocation is broadly similar to the previous quarter.

Fund Selection

The contribution from fund selection was all positive for the quarter.

Amplify SCI Strategic Income delivered a strong absolute performance in the final quarter of the year and managed to outperform peers. The fund's higher overall duration, relative to peers, of close to 3 years was a tailwind to performance over the quarter as medium and long dated SA government bonds delivered strong performance. This was largely due to more dovish communication from the major central banks during the quarter, with many indicating that with inflation moderating they expect to be able to reduce interest rates during the 2024 calendar year. The fund also benefitted from a small allocation of 4% to local listed property, which was the best performing local asset class over the quarter with a return of 16.4%.

10X S&P SA Top 50 produced a second quartile return, following the broad market strength this quarter. Exposure to gold miners as well as SA financials contributed to performance. On the other hand, exposure to resource and energy counters detracted from performance. Among the detractors, the positions in Anglo American (-11.8%), Sasol (-29.0%), and Sibanye Stillwater (-14.8%) all detracted from performance this quarter. Among the outperformers this quarter, Gold Fields (+35.3%), FirstRand (+18.7%) and Standard Bank (+13.3%) all contributed to performance.

The Ninety One Global Franchise FF demonstrated commendable performance over the quarter, surpassing peer funds and aligning with its benchmark. It's important to note that we don't anticipate the fund to outperform significantly during robust market rallies. This is due to the fund's investment philosophy, which leans towards more defensive and stable companies, specifically in the Consumer Staples and Healthcare sectors. These sectors typically lag during sharp market upswings. However, it's worth highlighting that the fund maintains a robust allocation to Technology companies, including Microsoft, ASML, Booking, and VeriSign.

There were no changes made to the underlying funds in the Portfolio in the fourth quarter.

Summary

We are pleased that the Portfolio managed to generate a strong return over the fourth quarter in a particularly strong global and local environment. We remain comfortable with the positioning of the Portfolio, both from an asset allocation and a manager selection perspective. The Portfolio continues to be allocated to a diverse range of attractively priced local and global asset classes and we are confident that it will be able to deliver on its objective over the long term. The fund has adhered to its policy objective.

Glossary

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1-year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest return: The highest and lowest returns for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month

Fund Specific Risks
