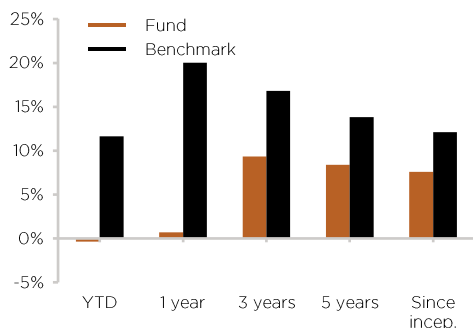
Investment Policy

The fund invests in a diversified combination of worldwide assets including, equities, bonds, property, preference shares, money market instruments, listed and unlisted financial instruments. The fund may also invest in other collective investment schemes, exchange traded funds or other similar schemes. The manager may combine the experience, skills and diverse strategies within Fairtree Asset Management with external managers in order to enhance the risk return outcome for investors. The fund includes and utilises the Smart Beta multi factor approach that refers to a passive style systemic solution. The Smart Beta multi factor approach entails efficient transformation of information into investment decisions, based on a well researched, transparent and consistent set of theoretically and empirically verified factors such as quality, value, momentum, investment and volatility. The manager has maximum flexibility without any worldwide asset allocation and strategy constraints. The fund is benchmark agnostic in order to maximise returns for the South African investor.

ANNUALISED PERFORMANCE (%)



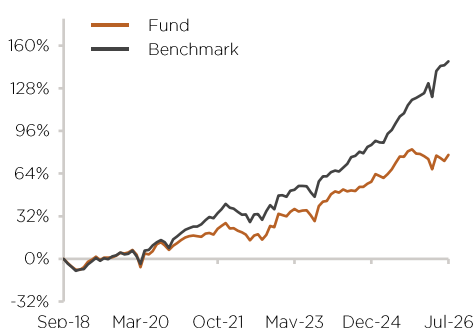

CUMULATIVE PERFORMANCE

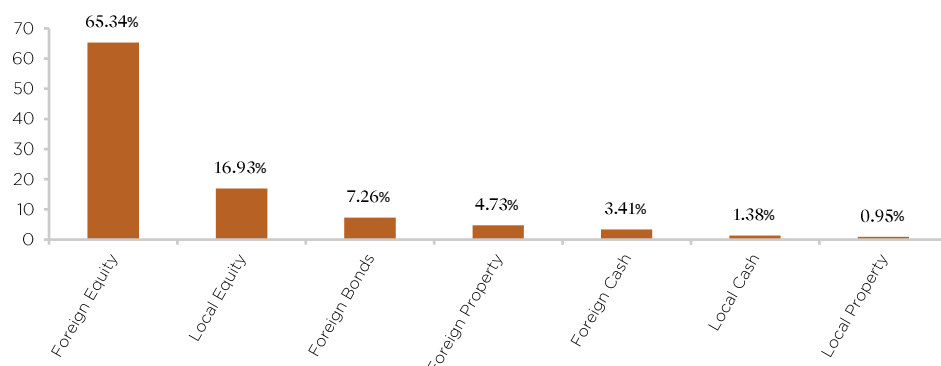

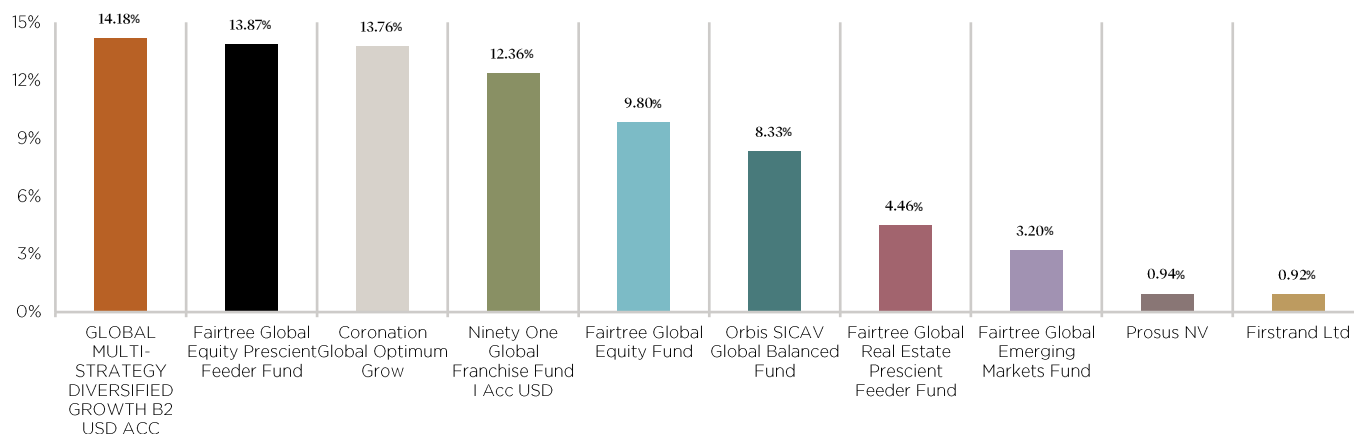

MARKET COMMENTARY

Global equity markets diverged in July as investors rotated out of the artificial-intelligence trade and the Middle East ceasefire collapsed. US semiconductors suffered their worst month since the Global Financial Crisis on doubts over AI valuations and capex funding, dragging the Nasdaq 100 down 5.1% while the S&P 500 was flat at 0.2% and the Dow added 0.4%. Value- and energy-heavy markets outperformed, with the UK and Europe advancing and energy the strongest sector as Brent rose roughly 23%. The unwind hit Asian technology hardest, with South Korea down around 23%, leaving the MSCI Emerging Markets Index off 6.6% (USD). Central banks held rates almost everywhere, but dissent grew, and long-dated yields rose.

US equities were mixed as Middle East tensions and higher oil prices offset resilient earnings. The S&P 500 ended flat, and the Dow gained 0.4%, but the Nasdaq 100 fell 5.1% on the semiconductor rout. Earnings reinforced a selective AI trade: Microsoft and Amazon rallied on strong cloud growth, while Meta, Alphabet and Apple lagged on rising AI costs and capex. June CPI eased to 3.5% y/y from 4.2% with core at 2.6%, but predated July's oil surge, which lifted inflation expectations. The FOMC held at 3.50%-3.75%, with three of twelve members dissenting for a 25bp hike, and Chair Warsh provided little forward guidance. The curve steepened, with the 30-year yield reaching a post-2007 high of 5.28%, and markets ended the month pricing a meaningful chance of a September increase.

European equities were among the few to advance, the Euro STOXX 50 up 1.3%, supported by energy and defence shares after Houthi threats disrupted Red Sea shipping. Second-quarter GDP expanded 0.4% q/q, double consensus, while inflation accelerated to 2.9% in July. The ECB held its deposit rate at 2.25% on 23 July but signalled further tightening remained likely, with markets ending the month pricing two more hikes by early 2027. Sovereign yields hit fresh multi-year highs on the oil-driven inflation scare, the 10-year Bund reaching a post-2011 high of 3.21% and the French 10-year ending near 4.0%.

South African equities outperformed a falling global benchmark, with the All-Share Index up 1.2% and the Top 40 up 1.4% as the market's commodity weighting worked in its favour; resources led (Resource 10 up 2.2%) and property climbed 2.3%, while domestic retailers lagged. June inflation accelerated to a two-year high of 5.0% y/y, driven by a 34.3% jump in fuel prices, with core at 4.1%. The SARB surprised by holding the repo rate at 7.0% on 23 July (four to hold, two for a hike), warning inflation would stay above 4% into early next year. The rand weakened towards R17.0/USD intramonth before ending near R16.5 (down 0.9%), and the curve bear-steepened, with the 10-year rising to about 8.7% and the ALBI returning -1.4%.

China equities were resilient but bifurcated, with Hong Kong outperforming the mainland and the MSCI China All Shares Index returning 1.5% (USD). Mainland shares bore the brunt of the global AI unwind, while the official manufacturing and non-manufacturing PMIs both slipped back into contraction and the property sector stayed constrained. Hong Kong outperformed on China-specific catalysts, chief among them the regulatory approval of Apple Intelligence, to run on Alibaba's Qwen and Baidu's technology, which lifted Alibaba, Tencent and Meituan.

Commodity markets were dominated by the return of the energy shock. Brent rose roughly 23% to end July near \$90/bbl, its strongest month since March, after briefly trading above \$100 mid-month as the US-Iran pause collapsed and a blockade threatened the Strait of Hormuz. Gold rose about 1% to roughly \$4,050/oz, its first monthly gain in five, holding above \$4,000 despite a firmer dollar. Platinum extended its recovery, up 3.7% to about \$1,659/oz and supporting SA producers, while copper gained roughly 5% to \$6.4/lb on falling inventories and electrification demand.

Glossary

Annualised Performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Sortino Ratio: A measure of the risk-adjusted return of a portfolio. It is a modification of the Sharpe ratio but only penalises the returns falling below a user specified target, or required rate of return, while the Sharpe ratio penalises both upside and downside volatility equally.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

High Water Mark: The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Total Expense Ratio (TER%): The Total Expense Ratio (TER) is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the Financial Product.

Performance fee incl. in TER (%) PF (%): The Performance Fee is a payment made to the Fund Manager for generating outperformance and is generally calculated as percentage of outperformance, often both realized and unrealized.

Transaction Costs (TC%): The Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the net asset value of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the Financial Product.

Total Investment Charges TIC (%) = TER (%) + TC (%): The Total Investment Charges (TIC), the TER + the TC, is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the investment of the Financial Product. It should be noted that a TIC is the sum of two calculated ratios (TER+TC).

Specific Risk

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

The portfolio has adhered to its object and there were no material changes to the composition of the portfolio during the quarter.

Risk Indicator Definition

The Portfolio is more diversified than the benchmark, thus holding smaller positions in the largest capitalisation stocks than the benchmark. This comes with the risk of more volatile relative returns to the broader market when the largest stocks in the benchmark outperform. We believe however that this strategy of holding a more diversified portfolio results in lower single stock risk, and whilst there may be periods of underperformance when the large cap stocks rally, we firmly believe in efficient risk management on an absolute basis. The strategy is also exposed to various factors driving investment performance, for example Value and Momentum, and these factors may also experience periods of relative underperformance. Global research has shown however, that consistent long term exposure to these factors lead to investment reward. This portfolio is permitted to invest in foreign securities which may have additional risks (FX Movements for example). However, the portfolio does not currently hold any foreign securities and the manager does not intend on exposing the portfolio to any foreign securities going forward.
