



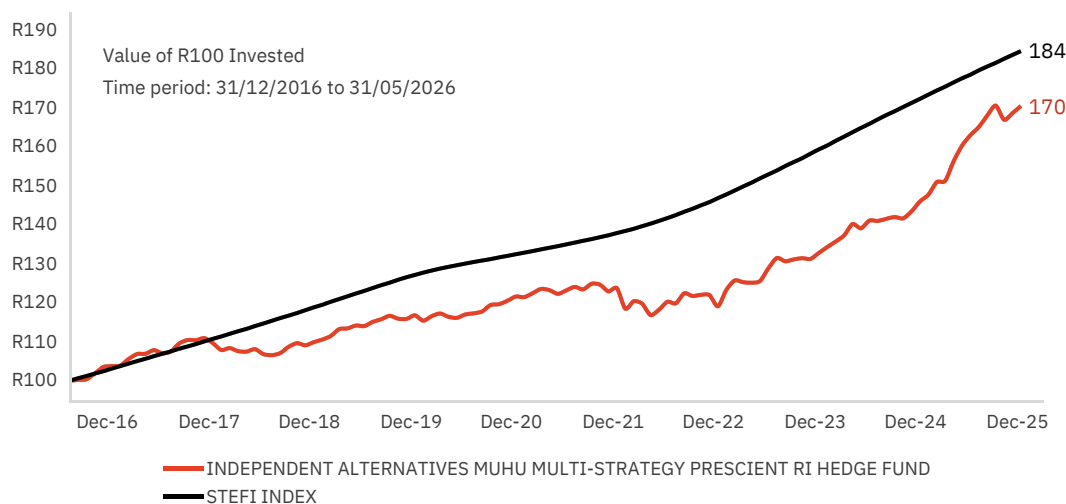
INDEPENDENT ALTERNATIVES MUHU MULTI-STRATEGY PRESCIENT RI HEDGE FUND

FUND INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE & SUMMARY

The Independent Alternatives Muhu Multi-Strategy Prescient RI Hedge Fund is a quantitatively biased, macro-thematic, multi-asset, multistrategy hedge fund. The objective of the fund is to deliver absolute returns that target Cash + 3% per annum measured over a 3-year investment period. The fund is managed according to a moderate risk profile, with lower levels of correlation, investment volatility and capital risk when compared to traditional capital markets. The fund seeks to capitalise on relative value and directional opportunities in a diversified range of instruments including, but not limited to, equities, money market instruments, fixed interest, options, repurchase agreements, over the counter securities, currencies, swaps, forward rate agreements (FRAs), contract for difference (CFDs) and futures. Independent Alternatives has adhered to the policy objective in managing the Fund.

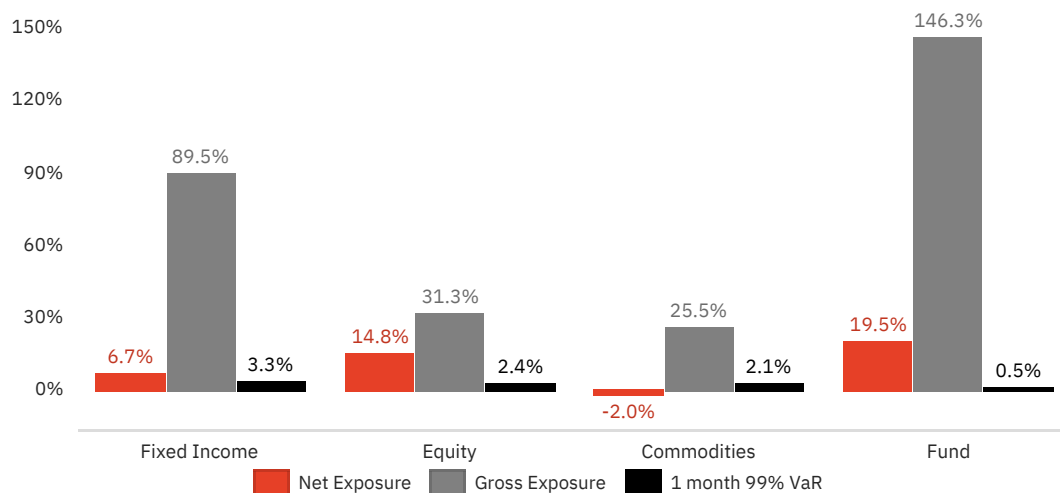

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COMMENTARY

Fund Overview

The Independent Alternatives Muhu Multi-Strategy Hedge Fund is a diversified, multi-asset hedge fund that seeks to deliver consistent risk-adjusted returns across market cycles by harvesting a balanced mix of return premia across fixed income, equities, and commodities. The fund combines relative value, carry, directional, and systematic trend-following strategies within a disciplined risk framework, complemented by tactical hedges designed to protect capital through periods of heightened volatility. The portfolio is constructed to remain liquid, transparent, and flexible, allowing risk to be reallocated dynamically as macro and market conditions evolve.

Market Dynamics

Fixed Income: Local fixed income markets continued to recover in May following the March drawdown triggered by the escalation in the Gulf conflict, which drove oil prices sharply higher and reignited global inflation concerns. The SARB hiked the repo rate by 25bps in line with expectations, accompanied by its most hawkish statement since 2022 — flagging that the war, El Niño effects, or a combination of the two could keep inflation materially above target. The FRA market is now pricing two additional hikes through 2026 and into 2027, consistent with SARB worst-case scenario guidance. The SAGB curve initially bear-steepened before tightening across tenors and flattening modestly into month-end, with shorter-dated bonds bearing the brunt of stagflationary repricing while the long end remained anchored by improving fiscal credibility and ongoing debt stabilisation measures. A resolution to the Middle East conflict remains uncertain, with conflicting headlines from Iran and the US keeping markets headline-driven and oil prices elevated. 5- and 10-year breakeven inflation rates continue to trade above the SARB's upper target band, though both have eased closer to 4.5%. Domestically, liquidity conditions remain robust — SAGB and T-bill auctions are well bid, domestic demand has largely absorbed offshore selling pressure, and gold and PGM prices continue to support South Africa's terms of trade at historically elevated levels.

Commodities: Oil markets remained highly volatile through May, driven by the US-Iran war and the near-closure of the Strait of Hormuz, with crude inventories drawn down sharply as exports surged and OPEC+ signalled a measured supply response. Precious metals stayed well supported on persistent inflation concerns and broader safe-haven demand, though gold and silver were whipsawed by headline-driven swings in the dollar as the conflict evolved. In soft commodities, the earlier normalisation narrative has become more nuanced: cocoa re-escalated on El Niño crop fears and short-covering dynamics, while coffee supply continues to build on a record Brazilian crop and higher Vietnamese volumes, leaving prices range-bound but uncertain. The US dollar strengthened modestly in May as markets priced in the prospect of Fed rate hikes to contain oil-led inflation, complicating the structurally weaker USD backdrop, though medium-term reserve diversification dynamics remain intact.

Equities: Global equity markets staged a strong recovery through May, led by technology and semiconductor names as the AI investment narrative reasserted itself and evolving US-Iran ceasefire negotiations drove significant intra-month volatility and frequent reversals. AI-exposed indices in North Asia reached fresh highs, while European equities remained more sensitive to oil price swings given their higher energy cost exposure, and cross-sector dispersion persisted with banks and energy names more vulnerable to headline-driven moves on Iran developments. Valuations in global growth and technology equities remain elevated, with AI-driven capital expenditure continuing to support activity but also deepening concentration risk at the index level, while Fed minutes flagging a willingness to hike if inflation persists added a further macro-overhang. South African equities were broadly flat over the month but masked meaningful intra-month dispersion, with an early rally led by gold miners giving way to weakness following the SARB's expected late-month rate hike, which pressured financials and weighed on the rand. The disconnect between improving domestic fundamentals — particularly in banks, retailers, and industrials — and still-subdued valuations persists, now compounded by a tighter monetary policy stance that may further delay a domestic re-rating.

Our Views and Positioning

Double-sided stagflationary risks — rising inflation alongside weaker growth — remain a key area of focus, alongside the evolving geopolitical and monetary policy backdrop. In this environment, we continue to favour a diversified mix of return premia across fixed income, equities, and commodities, with an emphasis on resilience and asymmetric outcomes rather than reliance on any single source of return.

Within fixed income, the current environment continues to favour a carry-oriented and relative value approach over outright directional risk, with attractive yields available across the curve and selective opportunities arising from periodic dislocations. Front-end instruments remain attractive on a risk-adjusted basis given elevated short-dated yields, while the long end continues to be supported by improving fiscal credibility. We remain mindful of second-round inflation pressures and retain a degree of inflation sensitivity in the portfolio.

Within equities, we continue to see value in a factor-aware approach that favours quality and valuation discipline over reliance on outright market beta, particularly with global growth and technology valuations remaining elevated. Domestically, we see a persistent gap between improving fundamentals — particularly in banks, retailers, and industrials — and still-subdued valuations, though the path to re-rating may be delayed by a tighter policy stance. Trend-following exposures continue to complement the equity book by broadening the set of return drivers across asset classes.

Across commodities and global macro, we prefer to preserve flexibility given the headline-driven nature of current markets, with selective relative value opportunities continuing to emerge across the complex. Trend-following strategies remain a useful complement in this environment given their ability to adapt to a wide range of outcomes across commodities, rates, and currencies. Defensive overlays are maintained to protect against tail risks while allowing the portfolio to continue earning carry.

The fund enters the second half of 2026 navigating a more volatile backdrop with a cautiously constructive stance. Underpinned by a disciplined investment framework and a diversified set of return premia, the Independent Alternatives Muhu Multi-Strategy Hedge Fund remains focused on delivering consistent risk-adjusted returns, capital preservation, and liquidity through changing market and geopolitical conditions.

Performance Fees:

The Fund charges a base and performance fee. Performance fees are payable on outperformance of the benchmark using a participation rate of 15%. A permanent high watermark is applied, which ensure that performance fees will only be charged on new performance. Performance has been calculated using net NAV to NAV numbers with income reinvested. The performance for each period shown reflects the return for investors who have been fully invested for that period. Individual investor performance may differ because of initial fees, the actual investment date, the date of reinvestments and dividend withholding tax. Full performance calculations are available from the manager on request. The investment performance is for illustrative purposes only. Total Expense Ratio (TER):

The Fund's Total Expense Ratio (TER) reflects the percentage of the average Net Asset Value (NAV) of the portfolio that was incurred as charges, levies and fees related to the management of the portfolio. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER cannot be regarded as an indication of future TER's. During the phase in period TER's do not include information gathered over a full year.

Transaction Cost (TC):

Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the value of the Fund incurred costs relating to the buying and selling of the Fund's underlying assets. Transaction costs are a necessary cost in administering the Fund and impacts Fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of Fund, investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER. The TER and the Transaction costs should not be deducted again from published returns.

Total Investment Charge:

The sum of the TER and transaction costs is shown as the Total Investment Charge. Since Fund returns are quoted after the deduction of these expenses, the TER and Transaction costs should not be deducted again from published returns.

Investing:

Investment subscriptions are processed monthly. Your application form together with proof of payment must be submitted to Prescient Management Company before 14h00, 2(two) business days before the preceding month end. Your application will be processed on the 1st day of the following month. The minimum initial lump sum investment is R5 000 and the minimum subsequent monthly investment is R1000 per month. No entry fees are payable on investing.

Redeeming:

Redemptions are processed at the end of each month and we require 1 calendar months' notice. To receive month end prices, your redemption instruction must be submitted to Prescient before 14h00, 1 business day of the preceding month end for processing at the end of the following month. No exit fees are payable on redeeming.

IMPORTANT DEFINITIONS

Annualised Performance:

Annualised performance show longer term performance rescaled to a 1-year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Return:

The highest and lowest returns for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown

NAV:

The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

High Water Mark:

The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Correlation:

A statistical measure of how two securities move in relation to each other. Correlation is computed into what is known as the correlation coefficient, which ranges between -1 and +1. Perfect positive correlation (a correlation coefficient of +1) implies that as one security moves, either up or down, the other security will move in lockstep, in the same direction. If the correlation is 0, the movements of the securities are said to have no correlation.

Maximum Drawdown:

The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Standard Deviation:

Measures the variation of returns around the portfolio's average return.

Sharpe Ratio:

Calculated by subtracting the risk-free rate - such as the STeFIFrom the rate of return for a portfolio and dividing the result by the standard deviation of the portfolio returns. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been.

Value at Risk:

The largest loss likely to be suffered in the portfolio over a 1 month holding period, as measured over the previous 252 business days, with a 99% probability. Value at risk is a measure of market risk and is equal to one standard deviation of the distribution of possible monthly returns in the portfolio.

RISK PROFILES

Moderate Risk:

Generally moderate risk portfolios have minimal market risk exposure, resulting in far less volatility than a more aggressive mandated portfolio and in turn the probability of capital loss (permanent/temporary) is less likely. However, expected potential long-term investment returns could be lower over the medium to long term.

Leverage Risk:

This means that the Fund Borrow additional funds, or trades on margin, to amplify investment decisions. This means that the volatility of the hedge fund portfolio can be many times that of the underlying investments. The degree to which leverage may be employed in any given hedge fund portfolio will be limited by the mandate the client has with the Fund.

Market Capitalisation Risk:

The securities of small-to-medium-sized (by market capitalisation) companies, or financial instruments related to such securities, may have a more limited market than the securities of larger companies and may involve greater risks and volatility than investments in larger companies. Concentration Risk:

Certain funds may invest a large proportion of total assets in specific assets or in specific markets. This means that the performance of those assets or markets will have a substantial impact on the value of the fund's portfolio. The greater the diversification of the fund's portfolio, the smaller the concentration risk. Concentration risk will also be higher in more specialised markets (e.g., a specific region, sector or theme) than in widely diversified markets (e.g., a worldwide allocation).

Performance Risk:

Capital Risk:

Repatriation Risk:

Interest Rate Risk:

The values of bonds and other debt securities usually rise and fall in response to changes in interest rates. Declining interest rates generally raise the value of existing debt instruments, and rising interest rates generally lower the value of existing debt instruments. Changes in a debt instrument's value usually will not affect the amount of income the fund receives from it but will affect the value of the fund's units. Interest rate risk is generally greater for investments with longer maturities.

Liquidity Risk:

Not all securities or instruments (including derivatives and sub-investment grade bonds) invested in by the funds will be listed or rated and consequently liquidity may be low. Moreover, the accumulation and disposal of holdings in some investments may be time consuming and may need to be conducted at unfavourable prices. The funds may also encounter difficulties in disposing of assets at their fair price due to adverse market conditions leading to limited liquidity.

Redemption Risk:

Large redemptions of Shares in a fund might result in the fund being forced to sell assets at a time and price at which it would normally prefer not to dispose of those assets.

Default risk:

The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments (e.g. bonds) may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

Currency Risk:

Assets of a fund may be denominated in a currency other than the Base Currency of the fund and changes in the exchange rate between the Base Currency and the currency of the asset may lead to a depreciation of the value of the fund's assets as expressed in the Base Currency. Derivatives risk:

The use of derivatives could increase overall risk by magnifying the effect of both gains and losses in a Fund. As such, large changes in value and potentially large financial losses could result.

Credit Risk:

There can be no assurance that issuers of the securities or other instruments in which a Fund invests will not be subject to credit difficulties leading to the loss of some or all of the sums invested in such securities or instruments or payments due on such securities or instruments. Funds will also be exposed to a credit risk in relation to the counterparties with whom they transact or place margin or collateral in respect of transactions in financial derivative instruments and may bear the risk of counterparty default

Correlation Risk:

The prices of financial derivative instruments may be imperfectly correlated to the prices of the underlying securities, for example, because of transaction costs and interest rate movements. The prices of exchange traded financial derivative instruments may also be subject to changes in price due to supply and demand factors.

Foreign Exchange risk:

Where a fund utilises derivatives, which alter the currency exposure characteristics of transferable securities held by the fund the performance of the fund may be strongly influenced by movements in foreign exchange rates because currency positions held by the fund may not correspond with the securities positions held.

OTC Markets Risk:

Unlisted derivative instruments i.e. OTC derivative instruments will be limited to unlisted forward currency, interest rate or exchange rate swap transactions and will only be permitted for the purposes of efficient portfolio management. Where any fund acquires securities on OTC markets, there is no guarantee that the fund will be able to realise the fair value of such securities due to their tendency to have limited liquidity and comparatively high price volatility.

Counterparty Risk:

Each fund will have credit exposure to counterparties by virtue of positions in swaps, repurchase transactions, forward exchange rate and other financial or derivative contracts held by the fund. To the extent that a counterparty defaults on its obligation and the fund is delayed or prevented from exercising its rights with respect to the investments in its portfolio, it may experience a decline in the value of its position, lose income and incur costs associated with asserting its rights.

Derivative Trading is Speculative and Volatile:

Substantial risks are involved in trading futures, forward and option contracts and various other instruments in which the fund intends to trade. Certain of the instruments in which the fund may invest are interest and foreign exchange rate sensitive, which means that their value and, consequently, the Net Asset Value, will fluctuate as interest and/or foreign exchange rates fluctuate. The fund's performance, therefore, will depend in part on its ability to anticipate and respond to such fluctuations in market interest rates, and to utilise appropriate strategies to maximize returns to the fund, while attempting to minimize the associated risks to its investment capital. Variance in the degree of volatility of the market from the fund's expectations may produce significant losses to the fund.
