
Investment Objective

#### Commentary

Investors had a lot to deal with in the opening quarter of 2025. Newsflow was dominated by US President Trump's policy actions (real and potential), and investors had to become familiar with a seemingly endless torrent of executive orders, one-liners, tweets and innuendo on a wide range of matters notably tariffs and trade policy, federal government efficiency, foreign policy, energy policy, and defence spending. It would be fair to conclude from market movements during the period that equity investors did not like what they heard and saw.

Coming into the year, expectations for US economic growth had ramped up, the US dollar was strong, and consumer confidence and labour markets in the US were also at strong levels. The possibility of a deescalation of geopolitical conflict in the Middle East and Russia/Ukraine added to incremental investor bullishness. An age of "US exceptionalism" was hailed.

However, this rosy backdrop unwound with each new Trump edict, notably with a sharp US equity market sell-off in March, as corporates, consumers and investors had to recalibrate the longer-term effects of US import tariffs, US government employee layoffs, and heightened policy uncertainty. The outlook for both growth (lower) and inflation (higher) weighed on investor forecasts for US equities in general. In contrast, European equity markets enjoyed a boost from a strong fiscal u-turn from the new German coalition, and a broader impulse for greater defence-spending within the EU. In China, investors cheered the arrival of DeepSeek as an acceptably cheap AI solution for the beleaguered Chinese technology platform companies.

The result of these contrasting impacts was a significant divergence in performance between the main stock indices of the US (all down) and stock indices in the other parts of the globe (almost all up for the quarter). The MSCI ACWI Index, reflecting the weighted basket of global shares, returned -1.2% in US\$ for the quarter, pulled down by the US weighting.

Against this challenging and changeable backdrop, the fund performed well, delivering over 3% gains for the quarter in US\$, and continuing a trend of outperformance over the MSCI ACWI benchmark. Notable outperformers for the period as a whole included Anglogold and Goldfields (the latter sold out during the period), Arca Continental, Shell Plc, Alibaba and EssilorLuxottica. Conversely, the main detractors from returns were US technology stock Broadcom (despite stronger than expected results and a very promising outlook for its products), Quanta Services (likewise after printing good results and with a strong orderbook ahead), Flutter Entertainment (affected by a late consumer-sentiment driven sell-off), and Novo Nordisk (hurt by increasing concerns over competition in the weight-loss segment).

# Portfolio Managers

# Rob Oellermann

Rob joined Laurium in December 2020 as a portfolio manager. Prior to this he was a founding member of Tantalum Capital where he was CIO. He was the portfolio manager for the equity and multi-asset portfolios under both long only and hedge fund mandates. From 1997 to 2005 Rob was at Coronation Fund Managers. Initially, he was co-manager and then manager of the Coronation Consumer Growth Fund. He spent 18 months in the Dublin and London offices of CFM, analysing European equities and managing the Coronation European Growth Fund. After his return to the Cape Town office in 2001 he was appointed as Head of Research, managed Coronation's segregated institutional balanced portfolios and was direct portfolio manager for institutional equity mandates. Rob started his career in 1994 at Allan Gray as a quantitative and fundamental equity analyst.

# Risk Profiles
