INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to return CPI + 3% per annum through a full interest rate cycle while providing stability by aiming never to lose capital over any rolling 3 month period.

INVESTMENT POLICY

This Fund invests in local and offshore money market, bonds, property, preference shares, inflation-linked bonds and derivatives to meet the investment objectives. Fund performance can be generated from taking interest rate views or duration, yield enhancement via credit instruments, asset allocation between income producing asset classes, offshore exposure and also via the use of derivatives.

WHO SHOULD INVEST

Investors seeking stable real returns and aiming to maximise income via exposure to primarily the South African Money and Bond markets. This Fund is suitable to investors with a short- to medium-term investment horizon and is Regulation 28 compliant

RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

These portfolios typically have no or low equity exposure, resulting in higher interest yields and stable capital values with the probability of capital losses over the shorter term (3 months) highly unlikely. These portfolios typically target returns in the region of 1% - 3% above inflation before tax over the long term.

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MARKET COMMENTARY

The quarter began with erratic market movements, largely driven by headlines surrounding the Trump administration. The FOMC kept the federal funds rate unchanged in January, citing a strong labor market and room for potential rate cuts later in the year. The Fund favored floating rate exposure in the 3-year segment and 10-year fixed rate exposure, focusing on government-backed assets to reduce credit risk. The Fund performed in line with its benchmark, with floating rate assets and Money Market exposure contributing positively, although Preference Shares detracted.

In February, market conditions remained fluid, with the FOMC adopting a cautious stance amid uncertainty. Domestically, political instability surrounding the South African government raised concerns. The Fund continued its strategy of focusing on floating rate exposure and 10-year fixed rate bonds. While the Fund slightly underperformed its benchmark, higher yielding floating assets and Money Market exposure were key contributors, though Fixed Rate Bonds and Preference Shares acted as detractors.

March saw continued market uncertainty, with the FOMC keeping rates steady and signaling a less dovish outlook on future cuts. Domestically, the South African MPC maintained the repo rate at 7.5%, reflecting concerns about the external environment. The Fund remained focused on floating rate assets with government exposure and maintained a conservative duration position. Although the Fund slightly underperformed its benchmark, floating rate assets and Money Market exposure helped performance, with Preference Shares continuing to be a detractor.

Overall, the Fund's strategy of focusing on low-duration, government-backed floating rate assets helped it navigate market volatility. Despite slight underperformance in February and March, the Fund remained well-positioned to achieve its return objectives.

GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

FUND SPECIFIC RISK

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

Derivatives risk: The use of derivatives could increase overall risk by magnifying the effect of both gains and losses in a Fund. As such, large changes in value and potentially large financial losses could result.
