INVESTMENT AND RETURN OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to return CPI + 3% per annum through a full interest rate cycle while providing stability by aiming never to lose capital over any rolling 3 month period.

INVESTMENT PROCESS

This Fund invests in local and offshore money market, bonds, property, preference shares, inflation-linked bonds and derivatives to meet the investment objectives. Fund performance can be generated from taking interest rate views or duration, yield enhancement via credit instruments, asset allocation between income producing asset classes, offshore exposure and also via the use of derivatives.

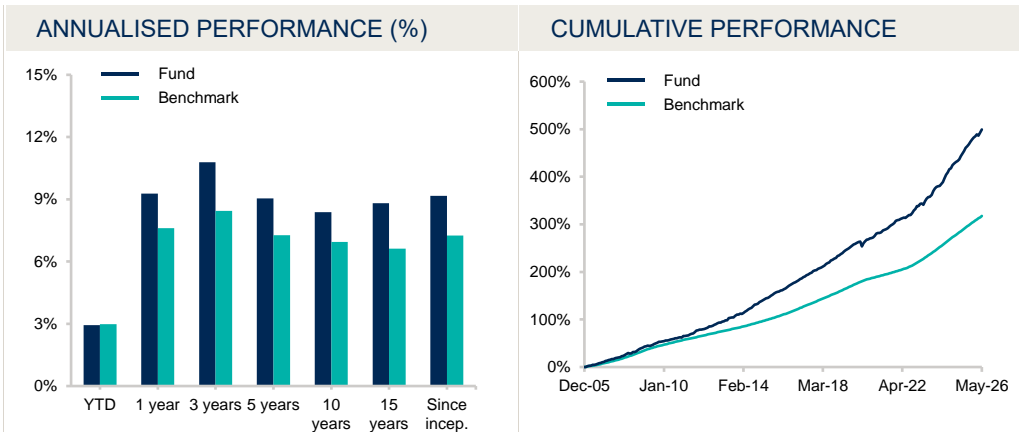
WHO SHOULD INVEST

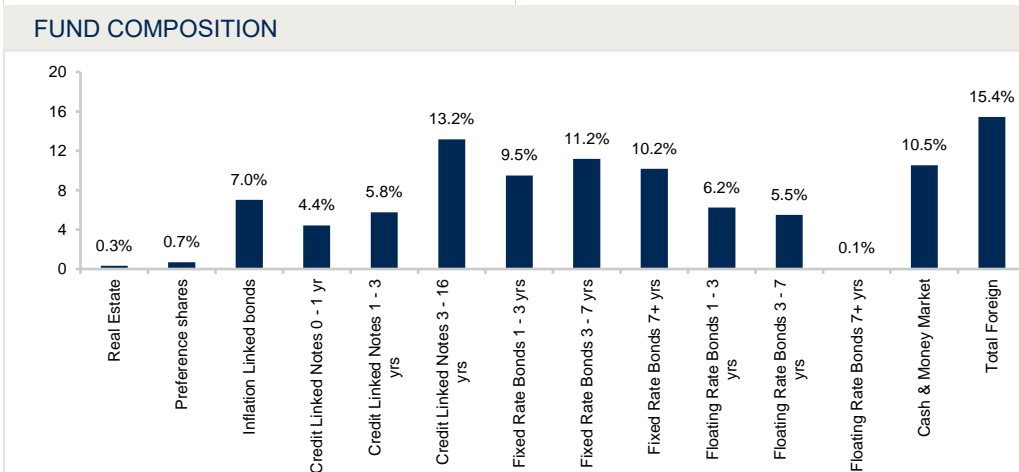
RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

FUND COMMENTARY

South African fixed-income markets staged a strong rally in May, with government bond yields falling across the curve even as domestic inflation surprised to the upside and the Reserve Bank tightened policy. Benchmark government bond yields declined by approximately 30 to 40 basis points over the month in what a principal-component decomposition shows was overwhelmingly a parallel move — roughly 35 basis points of level decline applied fairly uniformly along the curve, with only a marginal bull-steepening bias and negligible curvature contribution. This translated into robust positive total returns across the entire curve, ranging from approximately 1.7% at the short end to around 3.7% at the ultra-long end, with returns broadly rising in line with duration. In short, this was a broad-based re-rating of South African duration rather than a change in the shape of the curve.

The rally was notable for occurring against a more challenging domestic inflation backdrop. Headline CPI for April, released during the month, accelerated to 4.0% from 3.1% previously, driven largely by an approximately 11% rise in fuel prices as the earlier oil shock fed through to the pump. In response, the South African Reserve Bank raised the repo rate by 25 basis points to 7.00% at its 28 May meeting — its first hike since 2023 — on a divided four-to-two vote, lifting prime to 10.50%. Governor Kganyago struck a firmly hawkish tone, raising the Bank's oil-price assumptions, flagging renewed food-price and El Niño drought risks, and signalling that further tightening could follow if global conditions deteriorate. The Bank's updated forecasts see headline inflation averaging 4.4% in 2026 and 3.7% in 2027 before returning to the 3% target in 2028.

Rather than selling off on the hike, the market appears to have interpreted the SARB's pre-emptive action as reinforcing its inflation-fighting credibility, supporting longer-dated bonds and helping to anchor inflation expectations. This was reinforced by a markedly more supportive global backdrop: Brent crude fell sharply over the month on hopes of a Middle East de-escalation, US Treasury yields drifted lower, and developed-market credit spreads held close to cycle tights. A firmer rand — supported by the higher policy rate, softer oil and a weaker US dollar — and renewed foreign interest in high-real-yield South African assets rounded out a constructive month for local duration.

Against this backdrop, the Fund benefitted from its income and duration exposure as yields rallied, while retaining a disciplined posture given the SARB's explicit warning of further hikes and the persistence of geopolitical and domestic risks. Positioning continues to balance attractive carry through shorter-dated and floating-rate instruments with selective interest-rate duration, and the Fund retains the flexibility to adjust exposure should the policy outlook or the global backdrop shift.

The Fund's forward yield remains attractive at 9.38%. The Fund has an interest rate duration of 2.05 years and a total duration (including ILBs) of 2.15 years. The current risk profile aligns with the Fund's risk objective, and we believe the Fund is well positioned to achieve its return objectives.

The Fund delivered a positive return in May. The fixed-rate bond holdings were the standout contributor as South African government bond yields rallied roughly 35 basis points in a broad-based, level-driven move, with the longest-dated instruments benefitting most. The Money Market and credit-linked note exposures provided a solid and stable income base, while the floating-rate, offshore, inflation-linked, preference share and property holdings each added modestly. The sole detractor was the USD/ZAR currency hedge, which cost the Fund as the rand strengthened over the month.

GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

Average Duration: The weighted average duration of all the underlying interest bearing instruments in the Fund.

Forward Yield: The Forward Yield is the expected combined income of the instruments in the portfolio over the next year expressed as a percentage of the current value of those instruments.

Fund Specific Risks
