

# PRESCIENT POSITIVE RETURN QUANTPLUS® FUND (A2)

## MINIMUM DISCLOSURE DOCUMENT

### INVESTMENT AND RETURN OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to outperform CPI + 4% per annum over the medium term by generating consistent positive returns while protecting capital over rolling 12-month periods.

### INVESTMENT PROCESS

The Fund invests in cash, capital market instruments and equities with an active asset allocation overlay. The equity component of the Fund is protected to reduce the risk of capital loss. The Fund is thus structured to optimise returns in positive market cycles and to protect capital during negative periods/cycles.

### WHO SHOULD INVEST

Investors seeking real returns above cash through the market cycle (typically 7 year periods) but also require capital preservation and downside protection over the shorter term (typically 1 year periods). This Fund is suitable to investors with a medium- to long-term investment horizon and is Regulation 28 compliant.

### RISK INDICATOR DEFINITION

These portfolios typically have moderate equity exposure or in the case of bond funds, longer duration bond exposure, resulting in some capital volatility over the shorter term. They are managed in such a manner that the probability of capital losses over one year periods is unlikely. These portfolios typically target returns in the region of 3% - 4% above inflation over the long term.

## FUND COMMENTARY

April saw the initiation of the Trump Administrations tariff regime and the initial decision to impose significant tariffs on a range of countries contributed to a notable decline in global financial markets, with most equity and bond markets selling off aggressively in the first half of the month.

Trump justifies these tariffs as a response to trade barriers against U.S. goods, and they are intended to support U.S. manufacturing jobs and open new export markets for American businesses. However, economists have raised concerns that these tariffs could lead to rising inflation, increase the risk of a U.S. recession, and raise costs for American consumers. Furthermore, these measures could strain relations with key allies in Asia and hinder efforts to counterbalance China's growing economic influence. China's response to these tariffs was the imposition of its own counter-tariffs which quickly escalated to the United States imposing a 145% tariff charge on China on certain products.

The response from most other countries was to contact the US administration to negotiate terms of trade, a response so widespread that the Trump administration decided to pause initial higher tariffs and set them at an initial 10% baseline for the next 3 months, while negotiations start. This news set both equity and bond markets onto the path of recovery with some of the largest positive one day moves in the past decade.

Locally, the proposed 0.5% VAT hike was cancelled after significant negotiations and last-minute court proceedings. Finance Minister Enoch Godongwana issued a warning that suspending the planned 0.5% VAT increase could have severe consequences for South Africa's economy. The National Treasury announced the decision to suspend the VAT increase would result in an estimated R75 billion revenue shortfall over the medium term. To address this shortfall, Godongwana has proposed adjustments to government expenditure which will likely affect service delivery.

On a more positive note, South Africa's headline inflation rate is currently at its lowest level since June 2020. This decrease in inflation suggests the possibility of further interest rate cuts by the SARB. Both headline and core inflation are now below the midpoint of the central bank's target range, which could justify a 25-basis point rate cut soon. This presents a potential opportunity for the SARB to further stimulate the economy by lowering borrowing costs.

Both the Dow Jones Industrial Average and S&P 500 recorded negative returns of -3.17% and -0.76%, respectively. Meanwhile, the Nasdaq ended the month with a modest return of 0.85%. The economies of China and Hong Kong were also impacted, with the Shanghai SE Composite falling by -1.70% and the Hang Seng Composite Index dropping -3.70%. The MSCI World Index gained 0.74%, while the MSCI Emerging Markets Index rose by 1.04%, indicating that emerging markets showed greater resilience to the adverse market reaction triggered by the tariffs.

On a local level, the tariffs have had a notable impact on the Johannesburg Stock Exchange (JSE), with South African banks among the hardest hit by the global market sell-off. However, these losses were largely recovered by the end of April with the index having gained +4.34% by month end. The South African bond market also saw positive performance, with the FTSE/JSE ALBI Total Return Index increasing by 0.19% and the FTSE/JSE CILI Total Return Index gaining 0.03%.

The Fund currently holds a positive stance on both South African bonds and equity.

The Fund was strongly positive for the month due to the strong rally in SA equity towards the end of the month.

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## GLOSSARY

**Annualised performance:** Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

**Highest & Lowest performance:** The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

**NAV:** The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

**Current Yield:** Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

**CPU:** Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

**Alpha:** Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

**Sharpe Ratio:** The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

**Standard Deviation:** The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

**Max Drawdown:** The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

**% Positive Month:** The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

**Sensitivity Analysis:** Shows the expected return of the Fund for the Performance Projection Period (label on vertical axis), at the end of the Performance Projection Period based on a range of potential moves in the equity market from this month-end to the end of the Performance Projection Period.

## Fund Specific Risks
