

FUND OBJECTIVE

The Fund is a Collective Investment Scheme Feeder Fund which, apart from assets in liquid form, consists solely of participatory interest in the High Street Global Balanced domiciled in Ireland. The Fund invests predominantly in developed markets and targets an annual return of US Consumer Price Inflation plus 3-5%* over any rolling three-year period. It aims to achieve this by combining growth investments that are undervalued relative to their prospects with mature, dividend-yielding securities. Actively employing downside protection strategies and investing across asset classes mitigates large drawdowns while allowing for moderate capital appreciation.

INVESTOR SUITABILITY

The Fund is suitable for retail and institutional investors seeking capital gains with a moderate tolerance for market drawdowns. While volatility is expected to be less than an equity-only fund, investors must be willing to endure periods of short-term downturns. An investment horizon of 3+ years is recommended.





FUND COMMENTARY

The Fund returned 5.39% for the month of December relative to a benchmark of 6.13% with constituents as follows:

- Equities (MSCI All Country World Total Return Index) ↑4.80%
- Corporate Bonds (Bloomberg Barclays Global Bond Total Return Index) ↑4.16%
- Property (FTSE EPRA/NAREIT Developed Total Return Index) ↑9.46%

As the market closed the year on a bullish note, with all major asset classes finishing with positive momentum, we reflect on what was a strong year for the Fund, reporting a stellar performance of 31.9%. Investors witnessed a significant turnaround, marking a substantial recovery from the challenging conditions of 2022. The year unfolded against the backdrop of inflation and the combative Federal Reserve's restrictive monetary policy. Despite concerns about rising unemployment and a looming economic recession, the Fed persisted in raising interest rates. As the year advanced, attention expanded to include a range of other consequential events: political disputes regarding the debt ceiling and potential government shutdown, the collapse of several banks, labour strikes and instability in the Middle East added complexity to an already dynamic landscape. Amidst these challenges, the financial markets demonstrated resilience and strength, evidenced by the S&P 500 and the tech heavy Nasdaq 100 delivering robust performances with year-to-date total returns of 26.6% and an impressive 55.13%, respectively.

Advancements in transformative technologies, notably Artificial Intelligence, continue to shape and redefine various aspects of our world and were a significant reason for the positive showing of the group of mega-cap stocks known as the 'Magnificent Seven' whose performance drove the S&P 500 for the year. Within the 'Magnificent Seven' Meta and Nvidia stood out as the top-performing companies, and both have justified their positions within the Fund's portfolio:

- Meta recovered from a tumultuous 2022, validating Mark Zuckerberg's substantial cost-cutting in what he termed "The Year of Efficiency" returning 194% in 2023, the second-best showing out of the S&P 500. The focus was on reshaping Meta into a more streamlined and agile organization. Amidst this strategic shift, Meta's Facebook platform witnessed a rebound in its daily active users, surpassing the 2-billion mark. Meta credited this resurgence to its AI discovery engine and the introduction of Reels. Meta also introduced Threads, a potential competitor to X (formerly Twitter), though it launched with mixed reviews. Adding to these factors was a resurgence in digital advertising and while the company remains committed to investing heavily in the Metaverse, there is a notable refocus on addressing current priorities and needs within the business.
- In 2023, Nvidia solidified its sector leadership in the chip market. The company's stock surged by an impressive 237%, making it the top performer in the S&P 500. This remarkable growth is largely attributed to Nvidia's crucial role in powering Artificial Intelligence, addressing the escalating demand for processing power needed to handle the vast amounts of complex data. As AI continues to permeate various industries, Nvidia's stronghold in this domain positions them favourably. Looking forward to 2024, sustaining this momentum appears highly achievable for Nvidia.

The Fund's property holdings LEG Immobilien, Dream Industrial, and Sirius Real estate all beat the benchmark index for the year, returning 30.3%, 25.6% and 35.0% respectively, displaying resilience against the challenging macro environment. As we look towards 2024 and the expected rate cuts by the Fed, this asset class has the potential for further growth as property valuations recover.

Throughout the year, we strategically increased the fixed income exposure of the Fund from 17% to 24%, capitalizing on the attractively elevated yields available. Simultaneously, we extended the duration of the Fund, positioning it for greater capital appreciation in the event of a decrease in interest rates. In October, the yield on 10-year Treasuries peaked at 5% but gradually decreased, settling at 3.9% by year-end. This volatility in bond yields presented opportunities to enter new positions at attractive prices. As the year progressed, factors such as softening inflation, slowing labor growth, and expectations of declining interest rates contributed to the upward trajectory of bond values in the latter part of 2023.

FUND COMMENTARY

In 2024, the financial markets could be influenced by various key themes. The Federal Reserve's monetary policy will be pivotal, as its effectiveness in guiding the economy away from recession and achieving a smooth landing hinges on well-timed rate cuts. The impending US presidential election introduces an element of uncertainty, as potential policy changes and their impact on certain industries through proposed regulations come into play. Amidst these factors, continuing trends from 2023, such as the prominence of AI and the focus on efficiency, will remain instrumental in shaping the performance of many companies. High Street will persist in its emphasis on assessing companies through fundamental criteria, such as sustainable revenue growth, industry-leading margins, and effective management.

GLOSSARY SUMMARY

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Feeder Fund: A Feeder Fund is a portfolio that invests in a single portfolio of a collective investment scheme which levies its own charges, and which could result in a higher fee structure for the feeder fund

WHY IS THIS FUND IN CATEGORY 4?

The Fund is rated as 4 due to exposure to shares and stocks, and the nature of its investments which include the risks previously listed. WHAT DO THESE NUMBERS MEAN?
