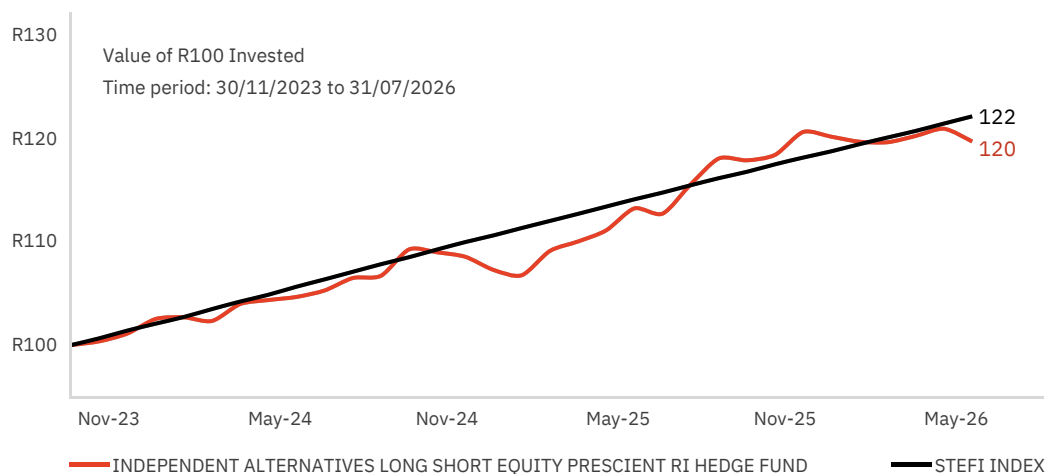
FUND INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE & SUMMARY

The fund is a conservative long-short equity fund, investing in domestic and global listed equities and derivative markets. The fund follows a rules-based investment approach, which comprises of a quantitatively driven long-short equity portfolio, overlaid with derivative hedging strategies to ensure outperformance during equity market drawdowns. Independent Alternatives has adhered to the policy objective in managing the Fund.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The portfolio will seek to capitalise on all investment opportunities across all sectors and will have maximum flexibility to invest in a wide range of instruments including equities, scrip loans, debt instruments (both sovereign and corporate), derivatives, commodities, preference shares, money market instruments, unit trusts, closed end funds and ETF's. The manager will calculate the portfolio exposure by means of the commitment approach. Gross exposure will not exceed 200%.

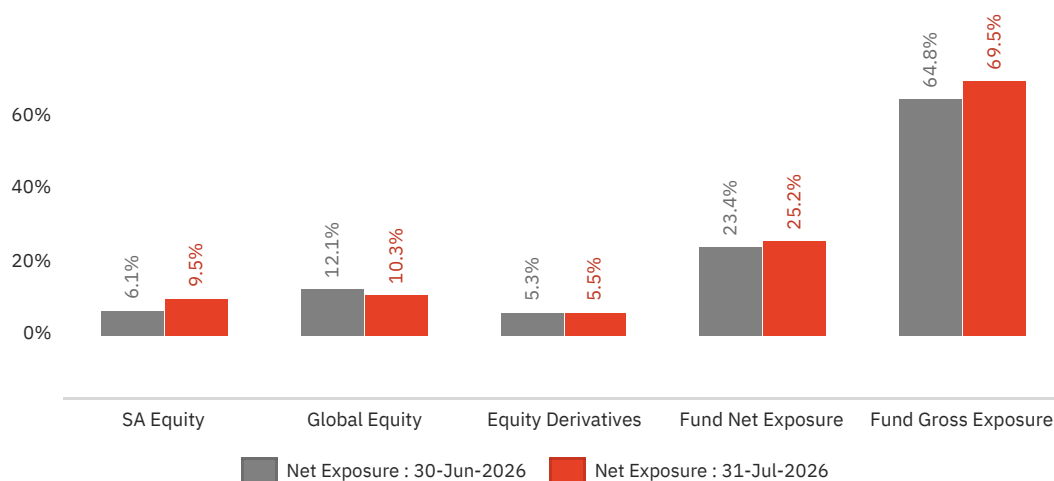

COMMENTARY

Fund Overview

The Independent Alternatives Long Short Equity Hedge Fund is a conservative Fund, investing in domestic and global listed equities. The Fund follows a quantitatively biased investment approach, which comprises of a quantitatively driven core equity strategy, a trend following strategy and a tail risk derivatives hedging strategy.

Market Dynamics

Global equity markets staged a strong recovery through Q2, shaped by two competing forces — the structural momentum of the AI investment cycle and the geopolitical overhang of the US-Iran conflict. Developed-market equities, led by technology and semiconductors, pushed to fresh highs as the AI capital expenditure cycle reasserted itself as the dominant return driver and proved largely insulated from geopolitical shocks, with the theme broadening across Asian technology markets where AI-driven export growth underpinned gains. Regional dispersion was pronounced: European equities proved more sensitive to the conflict given their higher energy exposure, with oil trading in a wide range through May, before the interim US-Iran deal and the subsequent retreat in crude lifted the laggards into quarter-end. Beneath the recovery, elevated valuations in global growth and technology equities and growing questions over the durability of AI moats kept concentration risk firmly in focus, while Fed minutes flagging a willingness to hike should inflation persist added a further macro-overhang. South African equities underperformed global peers, remaining more susceptible to geopolitical and domestic policy risks, with intra-quarter volatility concentrated in rate-sensitive financials and headline-driven resource names and the SARB's expected late-May rate hike weighing on sentiment. Since the interim deal, however, local markets have begun to recover as easing oil and inflation fears lifted sentiment, the rand firmed, and risk appetite steadied into quarter-end. Domestically, the disconnect between improving fundamentals — particularly in banks, retailers, and industrials — and still-subdued valuations persists, now compounded by a tighter monetary policy stance that may further delay a re-rating.

Our Views and Positioning

Our initial double-sided stagflationary fears — rising inflation set against softening growth — now appear to have subsided, supported by better-than-expected incoming data, a truce and interim deal in the Gulf, and oil retreating back toward pre-war levels; accordingly, we do not expect disruptive inflation over the short term. A still-evolving geopolitical and monetary policy backdrop nonetheless keeps us alert. Against this, we continue to favour a diversified blend of return premia across equities, prioritising resilience and asymmetric outcomes over dependence on any single source of return.

We maintain a factor-aware stance that prioritises quality and valuation discipline over reliance on broad market beta, all the more relevant with global growth and technology valuations still stretched. Domestically, a persistent gap remains between improving fundamentals — notably in banks, retailers, and industrials — and still-subdued valuations, though a tighter policy stance may push out the timing of any re-rating. Trend-following exposures continue to complement the equity book, broadening the range of return drivers across asset classes. We maintain defensive overlays to guard against tail risks while allowing the portfolio to keep earning carry.

The fund enters the second half of 2026 with a cautiously constructive stance, well placed to navigate a more volatile backdrop. Anchored by a disciplined investment framework and a diversified set of return premia, the Independent Alternatives Long Short Equity Hedge Fund remains focused on delivering consistent risk-adjusted returns, capital preservation, and liquidity through shifting market and geopolitical conditions.

Performance Fees:

The Fund charges a base and performance fee. Performance fees are payable on outperformance of the benchmark using a participation rate of 20%. A permanent high watermark is applied, which ensure that performance fees will only be charged on new performance. Performance has been calculated using net NAV to NAV numbers with income reinvested. The performance for each period shown reflects the return for investors who have been fully invested for that period. Individual investor performance may differ as a result of initial fees, the actual investment date, the date of reinvestments and dividend withholding tax. Full performance calculations are available from the manager on request.

Total Expense Ratio (TER):

The Fund's Total Expense Ratio (TER) reflects the percentage of the average Net Asset Value (NAV) of the portfolio that was incurred as charges, levies and fees related to the management of the portfolio. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER cannot be regarded as an indication of future TER's. During the phase in period TER's do not include information gathered over a full year.

Transaction Cost (TC):

Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the value of the Fund incurred costs relating to the buying and selling of the Fund's underlying assets. Transaction costs are a necessary cost in administering the Fund and impacts Fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of Fund, investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER. The TER and the Transaction costs should not be deducted again from published returns.

Total Investment Charge

The sum of the TER and transaction costs is shown as the Total Investment Charge. Since Fund returns are quoted after the deduction of these expenses, the TER and Transaction costs should not be deducted again from published returns.

IMPORTANT DEFINITIONS

Annualised Performance:

Annualised performance show longer term performance rescaled to a 1-year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Return:

The highest and lowest returns for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV:

The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

High Water Mark:

The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Correlation:

A statistical measure of how two securities move in relation to each other. Correlation is computed into what is known as the correlation coefficient, which ranges between -1 and +1. Perfect positive correlation (a correlation coefficient of +1) implies that as one security moves, either up or down, the other security will move in lockstep, in the same direction. If the correlation is 0, the movements of the securities are said to have no correlation.

Maximum Drawdown:

The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Standard Deviation:

Measures the variation of returns around the portfolio's average return.

Sharpe Ratio:

Calculated by subtracting the risk-free rate - such as the STeFI from the rate of return for a portfolio and dividing the result by the standard deviation of the portfolio returns. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been.

Value at Risk:

Is the largest loss likely to be suffered in the portfolio over a 1 month holding period, as measured over the previous 252 business days, with a 99% probability. Value at risk is a measure of market risk and is equal to one standard deviation of the distribution of possible monthly returns in the portfolio.

RISK PROFILES

Moderate Risk:

Generally moderate risk portfolios have minimal market risk exposure, resulting in far less volatility than a more aggressive mandated portfolio and in turn the probability of capital loss (permanent/temporary) is less likely. However, expected potential long-term investment returns could be lower over the medium to long term.

Leverage Risk:

This means that the Fund Borrow additional funds, or trades on margin, to amplify investment decisions. This means that the volatility of the hedge fund portfolio can be many times that of the underlying investments. The degree to which leverage may be employed in any given hedge fund portfolio will be limited by the mandate the client has with the Fund.

Market Capitalisation Risk:

The securities of small-to-medium-sized (by market capitalisation) companies, or financial instruments related to such securities, may have a more limited market than the securities of larger companies and may involve greater risks and volatility than investments in larger companies. Accordingly, it may be more difficult to effect sales of such securities at an advantageous time or without a substantial drop in price than securities of a company with a large market capitalisation and broad trading market. In addition, securities of small-to-medium-sized companies may have greater price volatility as they are generally more vulnerable to adverse market factors such as unfavourable economic reports.

Settlement Risk:

It is possible that settlement via a payment system will not take place as expected because payment or delivery by a counterparty fails to take place or is not in accordance with the initial conditions. This risk exists to the extent that the fund invests in regions where the financial markets are not yet well developed and includes stock exchanges or markets on which the fund may trade derivatives which may not be the same as those in more developed markets. Custodian Risk:

It is possible that the assets of a fund that are held in custody may be lost as a result of insolvency, negligence or fraud on the part of the Custodian or any Sub-Custodian.

Concentration Risk:

Certain funds may invest a large proportion of total assets in specific assets or in specific markets. This means that the performance of those assets or markets will have a substantial impact on the value of the fund's portfolio. The greater the diversification of the fund's portfolio, the smaller the concentration risk. Concentration risk will also be higher in more specialised markets (e.g., a specific region, sector or theme) than in widely diversified markets (e.g., a worldwide allocation).

Performance Risk:

The risk of lower returns in a fund may vary depending on the choices made by the Manager or any Investment Manager, as well as the existence or non-existence of, or restrictions upon, any third-party security. The risk depends in part on the market risk and on how active the Manager is in the management of the Fund.

Capital Risk:

The capital value of Shares of a fund may be affected by various risks to capital, including the potential risk of erosion due to the redemption of Shares and the distribution of profit in excess of the investment return. This risk can be limited by loss-mitigation, capital-protection or capital-guarantee techniques.

Repatriation Risk:

It may not be possible for funds to repatriate capital, dividends, interest and other income from certain countries, or it may require government consents to do so. Interest Rate Risk:

The values of bonds and other debt securities usually rise and fall in response to changes in interest rates. Changes in a debt instrument's value usually will not affect the amount of income the fund receives from it but will affect the value of the fund's units. Interest rate risk is generally greater for investments with longer maturities.

Liquidity Risk:

Not all securities or instruments (including derivatives and sub-investment grade bonds) invested in by the funds will be listed or rated and consequently liquidity may be low. Moreover, the accumulation and disposal of holdings in some investments may be time consuming and may need to be conducted at unfavourable prices. The funds may also encounter difficulties in disposing of assets at their fair price due to adverse market conditions leading to limited liquidity.

Redemption Risk:

Large redemptions of Shares in a fund might result in the fund being forced to sell assets at a time and price at which it would normally prefer not to dispose of those assets.

Default Risk:

The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments (e.g. bonds) may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

Currency Risk:

Assets of a fund may be denominated in a currency other than the Base Currency of the fund and changes in the exchange rate between the Base Currency and the currency of the asset may lead to a depreciation of the value of the fund's assets as expressed in the Base Currency. It may not be possible or practical to hedge against such exchange rate risk. The fund's Investment Manager may, but is not obliged to, mitigate this risk by using financial instruments.

Derivatives Risk:

The use of derivatives could increase overall risk by magnifying the effect of both gains and losses in a Fund. As such, large changes in value and potentially large financial losses could result.

Credit Risk:

There can be no assurance that issuers of the securities or other instruments in which a Fund invests will not be subject to credit difficulties leading to the loss of some or all of the sums invested in such securities or instruments or payments due on such securities or instruments. Funds will also be exposed to a credit risk in relation to the counterparties with whom they transact or place margin or collateral in respect of transactions in financial derivative instruments and may bear the risk of counterparty default.

Correlation Risk:

The prices of financial derivative instruments may be imperfectly correlated to the prices of the underlying securities, for example, because of transaction costs and interest rate movements. The prices of exchange traded financial derivative instruments may also be subject to changes in price due to supply and demand factors.

Foreign Exchange Risk:

Where a fund utilises derivatives, which alter the currency exposure characteristics of transferable securities held by the fund the performance of the fund may be strongly influenced by movements in foreign exchange rates because currency positions held by the fund may not correspond with the securities positions held.

OTC Markets Risk:

Unlisted derivative instruments i.e. OTC derivative instruments will be limited to unlisted forward currency, interest rate or exchange rate swap transactions and will only be permitted for the purposes of efficient portfolio management. Where any fund acquires securities on OTC markets, there is no guarantee that the fund will be able to realise the fair value of such securities due to their tendency to have limited liquidity and comparatively high price volatility.

Counterparty Risk:

Each fund will have credit exposure to counterparties by virtue of positions in swaps, repurchase transactions, forward exchange rate and other financial or derivative contracts held by the fund. To the extent that a counterparty defaults on its obligation and the fund is delayed or prevented from exercising its rights with respect to the investments in its portfolio, it may experience a decline in the value of its position, lose income and incur costs associated with asserting its rights.

Derivative Trading is Speculative and Volatile:

Substantial risks are involved in trading futures, forward and option contracts and various other instruments in which the fund intends to trade. Certain of the instruments in which the fund may invest are interest and foreign exchange rate sensitive, which means that their value and, consequently, the Net Asset Value, will fluctuate as interest and/or foreign exchange rates fluctuate. The fund's performance, therefore, will depend in part on its ability to anticipate and respond to such fluctuations in market interest rates, and to utilise appropriate strategies to maximize returns to the fund, while attempting to minimize the associated risks to its investment capital. Variance in the degree of volatility of the market from the fund's expectations may produce significant losses to the fund.
