The Fairtree Equity Prescient Fund is an actively managed general equity fund with a focus on maximizing total returns in excess of the benchmark, after fees, over the long term.

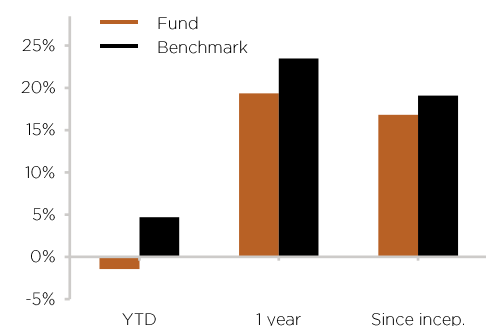
Investment Policy

The portfolio will aim to deliver long term capital growth by investing in both local and global equity markets. In order to achieve this objective, the portfolio will invest in selected shares across all industry sectors ranging across large, mid and smaller cap shares. The portfolio will seek to capture value by focusing on equity selection opportunities as well as quantitative screening process, based on various factors. The portfolio may include local, global developed and global emerging market equities. The portfolio will be exposed to exchange rate risk.

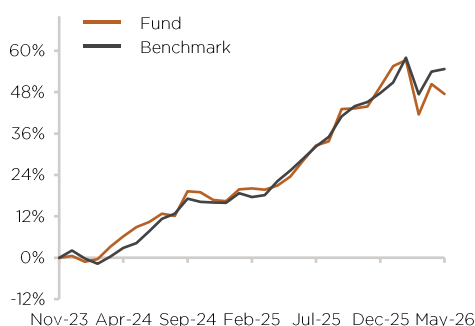
RISK INDICATOR

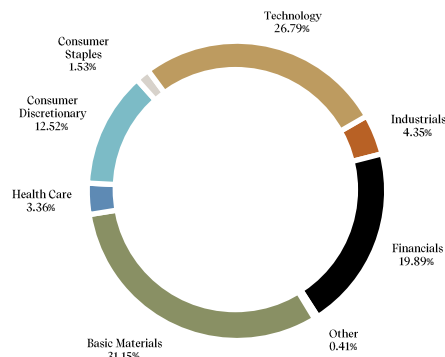

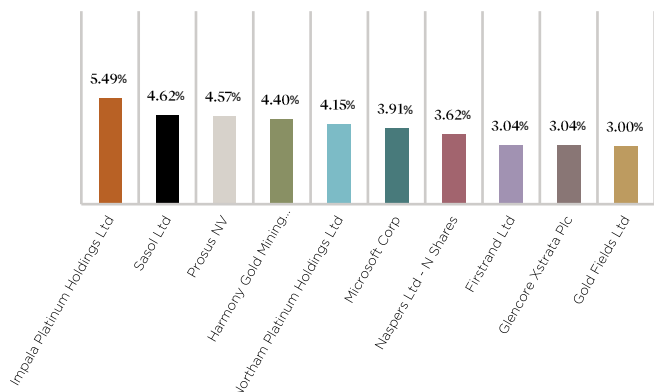
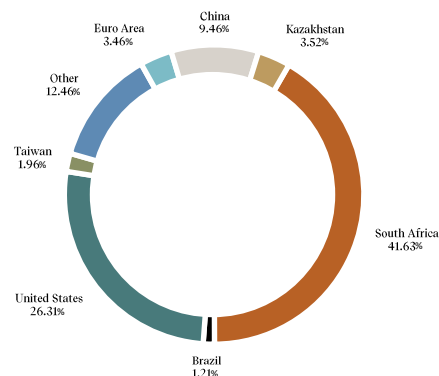

MARKET COMMENTARY

The fund returned -1.93% for the month, underperforming the benchmark by 2.41%. The JSE Capped All Share Index declined 0.3% over the month, while the MSCI ACWI Index increased by 1.96% (all in ZAR).

Global equity markets continued to recover in May, building on April's rebound as geopolitical risks eased and investor appetite for risk assets improved. US equities were particularly strong, with the S&P 500 up 5.3% and the Nasdaq 100 advancing 10.6%, supported by strength in technology and semiconductor stocks. The rally was driven by optimism around AI-related capital expenditure and earnings growth, with semiconductor-linked markets also performing strongly, particularly in Asia. Improved geopolitical sentiment also supported markets, as progress in US-Iran ceasefire negotiations helped reduce the risk premium that had built up in oil markets during March and April. Brent crude fell sharply as investors priced in a lower probability of broader regional escalation, although the improvement remains fragile, with security risks in the region continuing late in the month. Central bank policy also remained in focus. The macro backdrop remained mixed, with April payrolls rising by 115k and unemployment holding at 4.3%, while first quarter GDP growth was revised lower to 1.6%, pointing to an economy that remains resilient but is showing signs of moderating momentum.

Emerging markets continued to deliver strong gains in May, with the MSCI Emerging Markets Index rising 9.7%, supported by the continued AI and semiconductor rally. Performance once again diverged meaningfully on a country level. South Korea and Taiwan were the standout performers, advancing 28% and 16.5% respectively, driven by strong demand for memory, foundry and semiconductor-related stocks as investor appetite for AI infrastructure exposure remained elevated. In South Korea, Samsung Electronics and SK Hynix continued to benefit from tight high bandwidth memory supply and strong AI-related demand, while Taiwan was supported by further gains in TSMC as demand for advanced chips and foundry capacity remained robust. South Africa rose 2.4% in May, delivering positive returns but lagging the broader emerging market rally given its limited exposure to the AI and semiconductor theme that drove gains elsewhere. Performance was supported by selected gold and index heavyweight exposure, although mixed commodity prices, inflation concerns and a late-month SARB rate hike weighed on domestic sentiment. Overall, May highlighted the extent to which AI and semiconductor exposure drove market leadership, while country specific macro and market structure concerns weighed on selected markets.

Notable portfolio actions during May included adding to Prosus, increasing exposure to the recovery in Tencent and broader Chinese internet sentiment. The fund also added to Gold Fields and AngloGold, increasing exposure to gold producers. Within financials, the fund added to Capitec while trimming Nedbank, reflecting a preference for higher-quality retail banking exposure over more cyclical domestic banking exposure. The fund also trimmed Mr Price and Sasol, reducing exposure to selected domestic cyclical and energy.

Notable contributors to fund performance were holdings in Fortinet (+66 basis points), Harmony Gold (+46 basis points), Microsoft (+27 basis points) and FirstRand (+13 basis points). Notable detractors from performance over the month came from Sasol (-68 basis points), Prosus (-38 basis points) and Zoetis (-34 basis points).

The fund's style and country positioning remain largely unchanged. The fund's current asset allocation to the JSE is around 57.1%, with the remainder invested in global shares.



Glossary

Annualised Performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Sortino Ratio: A measure of the risk-adjusted return of a portfolio. It is a modification of the Sharpe ratio but only penalises the returns falling below a user specified target, or required rate of return, while the Sharpe ratio penalises both upside and downside volatility equally.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

High Water Mark: The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Performance Fee Cap: The maximum performance fee that can be charged over a specified period

Total Expense Ratio (TER%): The Total Expense Ratio (TER) is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the Financial Product.

Performance fee incl. in TER (%) PF (%): The Performance Fee is a payment made to the Fund Manager for generating outperformance and is generally calculated as percentage of outperformance, often both realized and unrealized.

Transaction Costs (TC%): The Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the net asset value of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the Financial Product.

Total Investment Charges TIC (%) = TER (%) + TC (%): The Total Investment Charges (TIC), the TER + the TC, is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the investment of the Financial Product. It should be noted that a TIC is the sum of two calculated ratios (TER+TC).

Specific Risk

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

The portfolio has adhered to its object and there were no material changes to the composition of the portfolio during the quarter.

Risk Indicator Definition

The Portfolio is more diversified than the benchmark, thus holding smaller positions in the largest capitalisation stocks than the benchmark. This comes with the risk of more volatile relative returns to the broader market when the largest stocks in the benchmark outperform. We believe however that this strategy of holding a more diversified portfolio results in lower single stock risk, and whilst there may be periods of underperformance when the large cap stocks rally, we firmly believe in efficient risk management on an absolute basis. The strategy is also exposed to various factors driving investment performance, for example Value and Momentum, and these factors may also experience periods of relative underperformance. Global research has shown however, that consistent long term exposure to these factors lead to investment reward. This portfolio is permitted to invest in foreign securities which may have additional risks (FX Movements for example). However, the portfolio does not currently hold any foreign securities and the manager does not intend on exposing the portfolio to any foreign securities going forward.
